





Enhanced Academic Supports – AS&R

- Peer Led Undergraduate Study (PLUS) was required for all students dual-enrolled in CHEM:1070 & MATH:1005 for the first time starting in Fall 2021! We also offered PLUS for the first time during a spring semester this academic year, allowing us to support a total of 284 students through PLUS!
- We expanded the Supplemental Instruction (SI)
 program into new courses this academic year, including
 College of Engineering courses, Computer Science
 courses, and College of Public Health courses, allowing
 us to provide support for 24 courses in the fall and 26
 courses in the spring!

Enhanced Academic Supports – AS&R

- The Learning Assistant Program provides additional support to students through the integration of Learning Assistants (peer leaders) to classrooms. Learning Assistants are undergraduate students who, with training and support, help facilitate activities during class sessions to increase active collaboration to improve student learning.
- This is the first semester LAs are in in-person classes and expanded into serving four courses: General Chemistry I, Principles of Chemistry I, Principles of Chemistry II, and College Algebra




GEAR UP

We employ 9 tutors in 8 different languages: Arabic, ASL, Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, Russian, Swahili. The tutors provide a hybrid approach offering sessions online and in person.

Through the Directed Independent Language Study program, students, faculty and staff are paired with a language tutor to work on developing oral proficiency skills. In 2020-2021, we created opportunities for language learning for students working on Fulbrights, poets, playwrights, and those seeking to learn their family's heritage language.

Student Engagement



Conversation Hour



The Global Seal of Biliteracy is a nationally recognized micro-credential that students can earn by taking a series of proficiency assessments. The tests measure the four skills (speaking, writing, reading, and listening), and students can earn one of two levels of fluency –Functional (Intermediate Mid) or Working (Advanced Low). This fall, we piloted a program and tested 17 students, three earned Working Fluency and 14 earned Functional. This test is not only a good professional credential for students, but also allows language programs to assess their students according to national averages.

Iowa Intersections: A Multilingual Narrative Project

lowa Intersections is a collaboration between the Center for Language and Culture Learning, UNESCO City of Literature, and Kirkwood Community College English Language Program. In the first phase of the project, Kirkwood students were invited to write and film a short story about their immigrant experiences in their native language. The stories will be edited, translated, and publicized and shared on social media; the goal is part of an effort to map the multilingual communities of lowa City and to give voice to the multiplicity of languages and diverse cultural experiences here.



Multilingual Writing Center

The CLCL currently oversees the **Spanish Speaking and Writing Center** and is seeking to find ways to elevate the profile of this Center and add other languages to promote multilingual writing at the Writing University.

Hawkeye Global Kitchen



The Division of World Languages, Literatures, and Cultures collaborated with the Division of Interdisciplinary Programs to write a P3 proposal to create an **instructional kitchen** for the teaching and learning of languages and cultures. While seeking funding sources and developing collaborations with offices across campus, including International Programs and the Office of Student Wellbeing, we are also developing resources for faculty to use to develop cooking-related courses.


















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
